### TRANSITIONAL THOUGHTS

#### What Do We Believe?

**One of our deep values** of our non-doctrinal faith is to take our own experience seriously. Of our many sources (listed after the principles in our covenant with our wider association), the first is:

*Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life.*

So our own *experience* is a source of our faith. This helps ensure that what we believe equates to how we live. But are we just independent people who believe differently but gather in community? Yes, to a degree. But that suggests we don't have common values and ways of living.

We have a long tradition of Unitarian, Universalist, and Unitarian Universalist theologians up to this day. We call it a Living Tradition, as we affirm there is yet more to know and learn. According to our first source, in our experience we engage wonder, which *moves us* to a renewal of the spirit. That's exciting! That's an adventure in faith.

In a **new online Questers class** called *What Moves Us* we'll explore 10 of our theologians, from the 18<sup>th</sup> to the 21<sup>st</sup> centuries. But we won't engage their theology academically. We'll engage a primary life experience of each, to understand how their lives influenced their thinking, then engage our experiences to see how these theologians might inform our lives. It's a class developed by our prominent African American theologian, Thandeka, who is pioneering what she calls Affect Theology to understand how human emotions become religious feelings. This approach engages the emotions for a fuller religious experience. See information on page 5 to register for this class that begins Feb. 10 on Zoom. It is focused on providing specifically Unitarian Universalist adult faith formation.

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## Message from our President



On Sunday, January 9, our church held its second annual Congregational Meeting by Zoom. We had hoped this year to be together for this occasion; however, the Omicron variant of Covid -19 put an end to that plan. And so, we Zoomed. Boards often worry, especially when the meeting is not in person, that there will not be enough members for a quorum. At the very start of our meeting, it was apparent we were going to have the necessary representation from our community. Thank you for taking time out of your day to join us in doing the Church's business. It certainly reaffirmed your commitment to our community.

Three new members were approved for the Nominating Committee, adding Cheryl Garret, Glen Grant and Rich Manalis to the returning members - Reggie Johnston and Maggi Mahan. And there were five members nominated for the Board; four agreed to accept a second term, and two are returning to finish their term; only the Treasurer's position was open. Fortunately, Jan Murphy agreed to step in and become our Treasurer. We will miss Margaret Leahy; however, she has organized our finances into a system that with Jan's help we can build upon, as we move forward. In addition, a second member of the congregation, Mary Ellen Baker, offered to function as assistant to the Treasurer to lighten the load. A huge thank you to the retiring members of this year's Nominating Committee - Steve Calkins, Frank Thomas, and Joyce Delgado.

In introducing our 2022 budget I described it as a "Budget of Hope". It is my hope that we will be able to bring our congregation back to pre-covid levels and begin to enhance programs and build membership. You approved this budget, and I am grateful for the trust you, our members, have shown by your vote. We will work to maintain that trust by finishing tasks we have begun: strengthening our committee structure; developing policies and procedures to back up our activities; creating a Personnel Committee and a Finance Committee to support our staff and Board. Our goal is to build a structure that allows the Board to concentrate on governance and long-term planning instead of management of daily operations.

We have two important tasks ahead: one is a discussion about who we are and who we want to become, where we are we headed and what might we want to be called; and the second is to select the search team who will find our next settled Minister. With the Board members you have elected, the budget you have approved, and the energy and enthusiasm you have demonstrated this year, I have every confidence we can do all that is required of us and more.

We started this Transition Journey together and together we will succeed. Thank you all for the opportunity you have given me to continue serving this amazing congregation.

## MUSIC NOTES FROM PAUL

When people think of music at their church, most likely the first thing that pops up in their minds is the choir, or maybe the pianist or some of the soloists. Especially, we are inspired when the congregation joins its voices together to sing a hymn.

Our church grew out of a well-established tradition and from the beginning, whenever the people came together, they sang. Sometimes it helps us to remember ideas or specific passages if we sing them, especially if the tune is catchy. Flipping through the pages of our hymnals, you will see that some songs were composed very recently, while others are hundreds of years old. This is one of the ways that we preserve our heritage, retaining the best songs of every age. There are always several songs that seem to be meaningful to a current generation, but with time they lose their shine and eventually are forgotten. Those that remain with us are often referred to as classics. They got that way because they have the power to speak in every age. They have a universal message that seems to be enhanced by the music that carries it.

There is nothing quite as powerful as hearing the voice of a faith community raised in song. This makes not singing in worship frustrating. The current Covid pandemic that continues has changed our congregational policies so that we have not sung in the pews for a long time.

We are looking for ways to cautiously reintroduce song to worship. The congregational Covid task force of the Board has now approved vocal performances from the platform of up to four singers who are masked. This makes possible more vocal music from the platform.

And, the choir can now gather to rehearse, staying masked and distanced. As we move into this stage, we continue to work toward UU Surprise again raising its voice in song. We are working to strategically bring vocal song into worship when we can do so safely. For now, we welcome more vocal performances in worship.



## MONTHLY BOOK REPORT

Hearts and flowers go out to our entire UU Surprise congregation! Please visit the library and check out the great expansive faith reading we stock. There is much to read. And much to cover this month, so I will get right to it!

I am modernizing the use of the library 'Reference' books section. With so much work being done at home, I am converting these books to regular check-out, so you may use them at home. As with the regular books, please complete the check out-card and place it in the card file box.

Four Reference books are terrific UU history oriented. All are different in focus and important to our faith (all in Reference 289.1 number area):

***"This Day in UU History"***, subtitled 'A treasury of anniversaries and milestones from 600 years of religious tradition', by Frank Schulman.

***"Historical Dictionary of Unitarian Universalism"***, by Mark W. Harris. This is a book of people, places and faith topics posted alphabetically.

***"A Documentary History of Unitarian Universalism"***, ***Volume One, the beginning to 1899; Volume Two, 1900 to present***. Both books are edited by Dan McKanan. Published in 2017 they are the most current of the type.

Next month I will feature the remaining books from the

Reference books collection so you may have the information at hand for your needs.

Next, I am doing a periodic clean up of the collection. Books no longer relevant, past their time or not being used will be removed. But rest assured you have the final say in whether the books are finally removed.

Potential books for removal are located on the rolling cart in the library. Please look them over. If you wish a book to be kept, simply remove it from the shelf and place it on the round table. I will reshelve the book. You do not have to be interested in checking it out (of course please do if you wish), you are simply expressing your desire it be retained.

Books remaining on the removal shelf will be processed out to the sale cart at the end of February. They may then be purchased for the small fee.

### Make a Tax-Free Donation to UUCS with a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

If you are older than 70 1/2, have an IRA (traditional, inactive SEP, inactive SIMPLE, or rollover), you can make a tax-free donation to UUCS and other 501(c)(3) charities. Your QCD donation can replace in whole or part your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) or be in excess of it up to \$100,000 annually.

Don't have an IRA, but have an inactive 403(b), inactive 401(k) or another Tax-Sheltered Annuity that you are taking RMDs from? You may be able to roll the gift amount into an IRA after taking your RMD and make the IRA Charitable QCD gift. Questions? For more information, consult your personal tax advisor,.
