#### Being More

As of this writing we've had the first of three History Wall sessions after worship. We recalled the life of this congregation from the first gathering Sept. 7, 1975, when 29 Sun Cities residents who were connected to the Phoenix UU congregation signed the membership book to create a fellowship closer to home. They rented various halls for worship and fellowship. They brought on a half-time minister, the Rev. Dr. Glenn Bomstadt, in 1981. On June 1, 1982, the fellowship was named the UU Church of the Sun Cities. Continued growth necessitated a full-time minister, and they called Dr. Nathaniel Lauriat, who served 1985 to 1995.

Needing a more permanent meeting place, they purchased a former bank building at the corner of 99<sup>th</sup> and Union Hills, and had their first service there Feb. 4, 1990. Dr. Lauriat announced his retirement in 1995, and they hired Rev. Oren Peterson as Interim Minister for a year while they formed a search committee to find a candidate for ministry. That person was the Rev. Walt Weider who arrived in 1996. Their building now too small, they found land in nearby Surprise and built the current building with their first service Oct. 3, 1999, renaming themselves the UU Church in Surprise. The new location allowed for being more than a church of retirees, as a few young families made their way here. Mindful of their mission to serve a diverse population, the congregation went through the process to become a Welcoming Congregation to LGBT individuals. The rest of the story will be remembered in the last two sessions Feb. 27 and March 13.

The Rev. Megan Foley has said, "When we believe that we are supposed to be more, even when we aren't sure what the road to it will be like, that's how we show that we are a people of faith." The early generation of the congregation found ways to be more. In our time, we are making the history that future generations will remember. We will be more than we are now to follow the call to our future as people of faith.

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## Message from our President



For those who either have not been back to UUCS in person or perhaps have not noticed – our name is back in full letters on our monument in front of the church. The name is the same; however, having shiny new letters on the stone to match the new paint on the Church and the welcoming congregation banner nearby is a remarkable sight when approaching our southern entrance, A huge thank you to all who helped make this happen.

Behind the scenes we have another group of (member) volunteers, those that help to raise funds to support our congregational activities, those who guide, grow, and protect our investments, and those who propose and create policies and procedures to make our work easier. It is difficult to recognize these volunteers as they do most of their work unseen and we do not always see the results - but without them we would be in trouble.

Then we have the invisible volunteers -our maintenance team- who work when we are not here. They are rarely recognized for what they do; however, we do see the results of their work –new LED lights in the sanctuary; the banner structure in front of the church; shelves in the closets; furniture placement in the offices and monitoring the solar panels. This is the team that works with Lois Bartels to keep our building safe, sound and functioning. The team includes Jim Gaunt, Steve Shanklin, Jeff London, Don and Susan Helms, Bob Walling and Frank Thomas.

A good example is Frank Thomas, who is currently replacing an old leaky fountain in the hall outside Sam's office. Frank is our plumbing expert on call and always prepared. He, like the others, does this work because they have the skills, the tools, talent, and they are committed to this congregation. None of these volunteers are seeking approval or reward; – BUT – when you see them, please let them know you appreciate their support of our community.

And if you are a new friend or member and want to get to know this community, find your spot with one of these volunteer groups and jump in. You will make wonderful friendships, learn about your chosen faith home and be supporting your congregation as well.

### Stewardship Campaign 2022

As we approach the end of the first quarter for 2022, as of mid-February we have received 65 pledges that total 71.2% of the annual campaign goal (see box). The average pledge has been \$2,471. This is a strong start at 6 weeks into a new year. I am optimistic that we can reach our goal in the next few weeks. Check the thermometer in the Social Hall for the most up-to-date results. Although testimonials have been completed, Sam will continue to remind you to contribute and pledge on Sundays.

We also raise funds in collection plates on Sundays and receive other donations. As of mid-February, contributions received are: \$500 from a non-member; \$499.76 from Sunday Collections; and \$22 in cash from social activities.

**Rigoberta Menchu** was born in 1959, the year I graduated from high school. By the time she reached the age of 33 she was an internationally celebrated woman winning a Nobel Peace Prize in 1992. She followed her parents in

the work of gaining rights for the Indigenous people of Guatemala. Ms. Menchu organized the first indigenous political party, **Winaq**, and ran for president in both 2007 and 2011. She is of Q'iche' Maya descent. Her mix of Mayan and Catholic teachings sustained her in the threatened work of organizing the women of Guatemala. She said, "It is not possible to conceive a democratic Guatemala, free and independent, without the indigenous identity shaping its character into all aspects of national existence."

## MONTHLY BOOK REPORT

In honor of our Golden Rule program activities, this month, I am featuring further reviews on three of our fine Golden Rule books. Please check-out and enjoy one of these educational and enlightening books.

**"The New Golden Rule"**, subtitled 'Community and Morality in a Democratic Society', by Dr. of Sociology Amitai Etzioni, number 303.3 ETZ GR. "A leading communitarian thinker, the author contends Americans have

overemphasized individual rights in recent years. In his searching treatise, he seeks to restore equilibrium between personal liberty and the common good, urging the diverse strands of America's social fabric to come together, to commit to a core of shared values that will help renew the family, schools and public institutions. Challenging liberals and conservatives alike, Etzioni cuts through a welter of issues, from bicultural education to curbing alcohol abuse, in this timely contribution to the debate over what constitutes a good society." Review.

**"Ethics and the Golden Rule"**, subtitled 'Do Unto Others', by Harry J. Gensler, number 170 GEN GR. "The golden rule is often dismissed by scholars as a vague proverb that quickly leads to absurdities when one attempts to formulate it in clear terms. In this book, Gensler defends the golden rule and addresses all of the major philosophic objections, pointing out several common misunderstandings and misapplications. He first discusses golden-rule reasoning and how to avoid the main pitfalls. He then relates the golden rule to world religions and history, and to areas like moral education, egoism, evolution, society, racism, business, and medicine. The book ends with a discussion of theoretical issues (like whether all morality reduces to the golden rule)" Review.

**"The Golden Rule"**, by Jeffrey Wattles, number 170.4 WAT GR. "The golden rule is presumed to have a single meaning, shared by virtually all the world's religions. It strikes the average person as intuitively true, though most modern philosophers reject it or recast it in more rational form. Wattles surveys the history of the golden rule and its spectrum of meanings in diverse contexts, ranging from Confucius to Plato to modern theological and philosophical responses and objections to the rule, as well as how some early twentieth-century American leaders tried to use the rule. Wattles draws these diverse interpretation into a synthesis." Review.

The Questers Adult Enrichment program has the goal of offering opportunities for growth in three areas:

## Make a Tax-Free Donation to UUCS with a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

If you are older than 70 1/2, have an IRA (traditional, inactive SEP, inactive SIMPLE, or rollover), you can make a tax-free donation to UUCS and other 501(c)(3) charities. Your QCD donation can replace in whole or part your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) or be in excess of it up to \$100,000 annually.

Don’t have an IRA, but have an inactive 403(b), inactive 401(k) or another Tax-Sheltered Annuity that you are taking RMDs from? You may be able to roll the gift amount into an IRA after taking your RMD and make the IRA Charitable QCD gift. Questions? For more information, consult your personal tax advisor.
