LOOKING UP, REACHING OUT

An editorial cartoon by Joe Heller in the Washington Post showed a couple standing on their deck, looking up at the night sky. Inside their TV screen shows “James Webb Telescope Success.” One says to the other, “I almost forgot what it’s like to hold my head up.”

Indeed. The news of the wonders of the Webb telescope was in stark distinction to the earlier news: war, gun violence, and a flurry of blockbuster Supreme Court decisions that removed the Constitutional right to abortion, struck down a New York gun law that may jeopardize other licensing laws, redefined the separation of church and state in allowing a coach to pray with his team on the field, and limited the regulatory power of the Environmental Protection Agency. And other such difficult news.

Then the news of the James Webb telescope showing us pictures of galaxies never before witnessed, giving us the taste of the infinity in which we live. The details of the telescope are staggering. From its perch in space the telescope is almost one million miles from Earth. With the advanced technology of its mirrors has the capacity to record images up to 18 billion light years away. The first images gave us a taste of the infinite creation in which we exist.

Meanwhile, on earth we struggle with the harsh realities that unsettle and shatter the lives of so many. What do the two realms have to do with each other? The one reminds us of our work in the world, to reach out and help heal the world, especially in these days. The other gives us hope and so we look up to know peace, hope and love are possible. Within these realities we live.

I return to the office August 16. Thank you for allowing me a time of rest and study as we approach our second year of transitional ministry. It will be a busy, active and productive period as we lay the foundation for a new generation of ministry in your congregation.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK



Greetings: To all those who are enjoying a change of climate brought about by leaving “The Valley” and to those who remain sequestered here, I send a warm (well actually “hot”) hello.

Not much has happened in the last month that will be new to you. We have chosen our Ministerial Search Committee members (MSC), and in case you missed the announcement, those members are Reggie Johnston, Jeff London, Libby Christianson, Juliet Gustavson, Michael Gentry, Brent Garrett, and Amy St Peter. Their work has yet to begin; however, when that happens you will hear. As I mentioned in the announcement, our part in this process is to stay involved and connected, as much of the work is done in the background.

Buildings and Grounds:

In June, our parking lot was resurfaced, and new lines painted. The job was done ahead of schedule and looks great. Asphalt Restoration was able to finish quickly, and we saved close to \$3,000 off the original estimate. The owner also reassured us we will have four good years before anything else needs to be done. We are still working on the Memorial Garden Fountain to be able to maintain it easily; hopefully, that will happen soon.

The Board, upon suggestion, has postponed replacing the carpeting in the Social Hall and Offices until we paint the interior walls. We are working on doing this soon (would be quicker if we had a Coordinator for Building and Grounds). We did have one unplanned expenditure this month; the hot water tank in the Office area (which feeds the restroom and workroom sinks) decided to give way. Thank goodness we have Frank Thomas – “our resident plumber.” He not only replaced the drinking fountain in that area, but he is currently replacing and installing the hot water tank. Thank you, Frank!

Board Notes:

At the last Bard Meeting, we reinstated the Church’s Financial Committee and approved membership to include the Chairs from Investment, Stewardship and Buildings and Grounds, as well as the Past Treasurer, and a member-at-large from the congregation. The current Board Treasurer serves as Chair of this committee. They will be creating a Charter for their work and policies to assist the Board with fiscal management.

We also started the first of two discussions on Board Goals for the next year. We have created a list with Social Justice being at the top and widening our circle the goal. Our final list will be shared with you as you will be a part of these goals, and we will implement them as time and cost allow. You will be hearing more on this as we continue to come back together to recreate our truly beloved community.

will be social events at the church. Stay tuned for more information in announcements about type of event and how to support the event, including volunteering.

On September 18th, Lisa Lawrence and our youth families will hold an "Ice Cream Social" after Sunday service. Come and enjoy ice cream and toppings and support our youth!

In October, a "Coffee House" with talent from our community will be held on a Saturday night. Please consider sharing your talents ... music, poetry, whatever. Summer is in full swing; the Arizona monsoon arrived early and strong. Time to pull up a cozy chair and stay cool from the hot wild weather days! Your UU Surprise library is proud to preview three more new books for your summer reading consideration. Please enjoy a good UU read or, if out of the area, a public library download or an online/in person purchase:

"The Soul of America", subtitled 'A battle for our better angels,' by John Meacham, number 904MEA. This donated book is from the NY Times Best Seller List by the Pulitzer Prize winning author. It is also one of Oprah's 'books that help me through'. This must read "helps us understand the present moment in American politics and life by looking back at critical times in our history when hope overcame division and fear." Meacham examines Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S. Grant, Theodore and Franklin Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, and on into the modern political scene. The struggle of hope over fear

continues. A terrific timely read.

"Pagan and Earth-Centered Voices in Unitarian Universalism", by Jerrie Hildebrand, number 290HIL. "These 22 essays by some of the most prominent leaders in UU Paganism bring this theology to life for a new generation. Featuring the writings of clergy and laypeople, this...collection demonstrates the many expressions of nature-based spirituality and the ways they feed the souls of so many. The essayists describe a broad array of practices...that bring us into harmony and balance with our natural environment." From the 5-star Amazon review.

"Haiku Mind", subtitled '108 Poems to cultivate awareness and open your heart', by Patricia Donegan, number 808.8DON. "If you want to know what haiku is about, what a haiku can do, why haiku are important, read this book. The author looks into the heart of haiku by exploring outstanding individual examples with a perceptive, aware, and sensitive eye. Donegan is a poet, translator, and promoter of haiku as an awareness practice." *Note from your librarian: This is a wonderful spiritual read! A 4.5-Star Amazon reviewed book.*

What a welcome break this summer has been so far! I love having the time to get to all the little projects that I'm normally too busy for. Families have still been taking advantage of the summer Sunday childcare, but things are much quieter around here during the week.

My first project was to promote an Our Whole Lives (O.W.L.) Facilitator Training Workshop. In one long weekend (Th-Sun) individuals can become certified to teach up to two different OWL curriculums. O.W.L. is a lifespan sexuality education workshop. There are seven curriculums: K-1, 4-6, 7-9, 10-12, young adults, adults, and older adults. Next was the completion of the Family Lending Library which is located right outside the nursery. There are over a hundred titles relating to a variety of topics, such as: Behavioral Health, Big Questions, Character Development, Childhood/Concerns,

Environment, Fun/Activities, Health, Parenting/Family, Sexual Identity and Gender Orientation, and Unitarian Universalist Identity. The purpose of this library is to provide educational resources for parents and children to assist with life's many mental, physical and spiritual developmental stages and challenges.

Other summer projects include: reaching out to other faith homes to potentially partner in the development of an Interfaith Youth Group; planning a co-hosted, family-friendly workshop with Temple Beth Shalom called "Hanukkah and Christmas as an Interfaith Celebration"; and planning next season's curriculum.

Our Sunday School season begins on Sunday, September 11th following the Sunday School Ingathering Breakfast from 9:00-10:00 a.m. Our very own Stewardship Com-

TIDBITS

Make a Tax-Free Donation to UUCS with a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

If you are older than 70 1/2, have an IRA (traditional, inactive SEP, inactive SIMPLE, or rollover), you can make a tax-free donation to UUCS and other 501(c)(3) charities. Your QCD donation can replace in whole or part your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) or be in excess of it up to \$100,000 annually.

Don't have an IRA, but have an inactive 403(b), inactive 401(k) or another Tax-Sheltered Annuity that you are taking RMDs from? You may be able to roll the gift amount into an IRA after taking your RMD and make the IRA Charitable QCD gift. Questions? For more information, consult your personal tax advisor.
