This triumphal verse from one of our hymns is confident about life, especially in the spring. With a cooler-than-usual winter this year, we welcome the spring. Speaking of golden mornings, April is Golden Rule month in Arizona and the City of Surprise. The Golden Rule is an ongoing ministry of the congregation. In worship we'll explore "loving our neighbor(hood)" and what that suggests about our mission. On Earth Day we'll engage our relationship (and our responsibilities) to our earth home through the lens of earth-centered or Pagan spirituality.

We also welcome the return of the Jewish Seder dinner Saturday April 8 (see page 3) where all ages will gather for joyful singing and observing of the traditional seder that celebrates freedom from oppression. As the seder suggests, oppression knows many seasons. History is replete with those who suffered in search of truth and freedom, and it's good to honor that struggle.

As I was preparing to preach in March on the book Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism, I saw a quote from the UU minister Rev. Natalie Fenimore. She said our congregations should build places to process pain and struggle as well as love and celebration. "You cannot really get to the mountaintop until you've been in the valley. You can't just skip over the struggle. As an institution, Unitarian Universalism does Easter without Good Friday." She said this in the context of people (and ministers) of color in our congregations seeking a fuller experience of Unitarian Universalism.

HOW DOES CHANGE TAKE PLACE?

In the UUCS music program here is how we arrived at our current status. The domino effect has been infused with excitement, suspense, stress, fun, hope, joy, and eager anticipation.

Enter from stage left, March 2020

OOPS, Covid

OOPS, Streaming from Individual Homes

OOPS, Music Director Retires

YAY! Music Search Committee interviews several capable candidates

YAY! New Music Director hired

YAY! Return to in-house worship with on-line streaming

YAY! We have new choir members!

OOPS, Streaming on-line requires copyright permissions for all streamed music.

OOPS, we need a copyright license.

YAY! The Board has approved purchase of a copyright license that covers all music from ASCAP, BMI, and SES-AC.

OOPS, we need a dedicated volunteer to track copyrights, report our music to the licensing agency, and notify musicians if changes are needed.

YAY! Our Music Committee has developed a policy and procedure to cover streaming our music.

OOPS, Music Director Resigns.

YAY! We have an Acting Music Director.

YAY! We have a dedicated copyright tracker, Mary Anne Poggenburg.

OOPS! Not all of the music we want to play in our services is included in the 20 million songs covered by our copyright license. Even some of the hymns in our two UU hymnals are not covered for streaming. We have to 1) call our licensing agency and learn who has the copyright, 2) request and pay for a special permission, assuming we get the permission, 3) substitute new music choices, 4) play the music without streaming it, 5) take a risk and stream it anyway, knowing that it is likely that Facebook and YouTube will delete the streamed service.

YAY! We have another new choir member!

YAY! We have a superb Special Music Consultant, Nico Barberan

OOPS, Based on our experience during the first year we need to re-clarify our original policy for streaming music. The Music Committee needs to tweak the policy based on our experience to date. For instance, there must be time to change music selections, if necessary.

OOPS, it is illegal to re-stream a video already posted on YouTube without seeking and obtaining written permission. Another possibly expensive and time-consuming process.

And that brings us to April, 2023.

YAY! YAY! YAY! This month our music will celebrate the energy of new membership, the renewal of spring, the beauty of indigenous music, and Mother Earth. Piano and vocal music will be featured April 2. Our choir will sing April 9 and 16. Nico Barberan will be with us April 16 and 23. Our service on April 30 will feature flute and guitar.

It's been a very busy month for Family Ministry.

On March 3-5th, Paige Rappleye, Annie Converse and I had the pleasure of attending an Our Whole Lives sexuality workshop facilitator training down in Tucson. Annie and I were trained to facilitate O.W.L. for grades 7-9 and 10-12 while Paige was trained to facilitate O.W.L. for young adults, adults and seniors. We also have facilitators trained to teach k-1st and 4th-6th grade. That means that we are able to teach the full spectrum of workshops! We look forward to offering some soon. It's been far too long.

Our Sunday morning classroom was bursting at the seams with a major influx of new and visiting families. So, when I returned from Tucson I turned our elementary classroom into a preschool, for ages three through first grade, and the elementary class is now for grades second through fifth. Gradual improvements are also being made to accommodate nursery families. The worship service can now be streamed into the nurse-

ry.

I will be the facilitator of the three sessions, not the expert. Please join us.

A TRIBUTE AND THANK YOU TO OUR LIBRARIAN



That little room tucked between the offices and Social Hall is our library, a room you may have passed through many times. Perhaps you've already discovered it to be filled with wonderful choices, thanks to MaryAnne Balzer, who has loved and cared for this library since 2014.

From the time she was a kid, MaryAnne loved books. Loved looking at them...what she could see in them...the worlds they introduced her to. Since MaryAnne was never a professional librarian, where did her library experience come from? Her Mom didn't know what to do with her in the summer, so she found an opportunity for MaryAnne to

work with the school librarian, and at NAU she also did work study in the library. As a result of those and other library experiences, MaryAnne learned how to do everything a librarian needs to do. Being our librarian is one of the things MA chose to do when she joined our UU community. How fortunate for us!

MaryAnne joined the UUCS Community in 2008. When she arrived, Jane Eisenberg was librarian with Mary Lou Rideout, her assistant. In the years before Jane's passing in 2014, MaryAnne had time to see and reflect on what the library was, as well as to imagine what it might be. When Jane passed, Mary Lou Rideout knew exactly who should replace her — MaryAnne. And with the agreement that Mary Lou Rideout would remain as assistant, the two set to work.

One of MaryAnne's goals was to make the library a welcoming space where people in the congregation would be drawn. The first years were a cleaning out time, and there was no pushback at the changes, which was not surprising, knowing that how people read and what they read changes over time. She kept what our readers preferred and the others were donated where they could be of use. Nothing went to waste.

MaryAnne has loved sharing and introducing new books – books on a variety of subjects and by a variety of authors.

She has appreciated hearing what people think about the books they check out. She has listened to people when they share what they would like to see in the library. As she has had funds, she has added books to the library...those that were requested and those she has found.

A unique service she has provided on the quiet – MaryAnne has assisted members and friends in writing invocations, prayers or statements of faith when they didn't have the words for what they wanted to say. In her words, "I do love what I do. I love being able to help people find what gives them a **broadening of faith, deepening of faith, or solace,** as the case may be." It's a spiritual mission.

I believe it's safe to say that we have had an improbable librarian with an activist approach that has created an unlikely little gem of a library. And it is now time for us to say good bye to our friend and UUCS's special librarian.

MaryAnne is leaving us to spend some time in travel and then perhaps locating closer to where her daughter is living. She will be sorely missed, **but** her love of books and her spirit of support will remain in that small room between the Social Hall and the office as a rich resource on our spiritual journeys.

Thank You MaryAnne, and we wish you the very best in this move into the next chapter of your life.
