CHANGING OUR NAME

Changing our name began as a request to eliminate the word "church". Growing up I merely thought the word was the name of a building where you worshipped. I have come to realize that to others it carries many different meanings. Many of our members believed it was time to eliminate the use of the word "church". Others did not see the need, so the idea was to investigate alternatives and determine the change with a vote. We added this task to a list of goals for the new Board.

Changing a word seemed simple enough and we

planned for it to happen in March 2020 when Covid arrived disrupting all of our lives, and we were abruptly closed down.

Since then we have had a series of circumstances that required our being focused on congregational work. The work was not more important but more urgently in need of attention. When we look at what has transpired over the last two years in our congregation, I believe postponing the name change was a blessing in disguise. Talking about it casually and recognizing we have changed as a congregation has opened the door to examining our vision for the future. It has given us the opportunity to really change our name to one that better defines us.

Our name has been changed for business twice before but never officially. We are still legally in the books as The UU Church of the Sun Cities. With a new pastor and new members come new ideas and new ways of doing things. And with the growth of the surrounding area we are no longer just a UU Congregation for Surprise. This is the perfect time to envision a new name for UUCS.


Setting the word "Church" aside, I want you to think about what we could be called. There have been suggestions: Sonoran Desert UU's, Friends of the Desert UU's; Northwest Valley UU's . There are NO Progressive /Liberal religious places of worship between us and Anthem. Imagine having an area where we can "widen our circle".

We will begin with a simple Survey that you will be receiving sometime in October, and then on October 29 after services I will hold a listening session in the sanctuary to hear your thoughts and ideas. FAMILY MINISTRY Lisa Lawrence—Director

To kick-off the first day of religious education classes, Family Ministry held its annual Ingathering for new and existing families on Sunday, September 10th. Families were welcomed in grand style with a full pancake breakfast, courtesy of the Stewardship Committee. It was nice to have the children with us in the service again, before being ushered off to their classrooms. We are beginning the new season with 14 registered children and youth.

We will be using the **Soul Matters curriculum** in our **preschool and elementary classrooms**. The theme is "The Gifts of Our Faith" and will focus on ten UU values. We will explore their potential to shape us and, in turn, shape the world. The values are: welcome, heritage, generosity, mystery, love, justice and equity, change, interdependence and pluralism. Although the overarching theme is the same for both classrooms, the content will be developmentally appropriate for each group.

Our 6th Grade and Up classroom had the opportunity to choose their own curriculum and decided upon "The Fifth Dimension". "The Fifth Dimension" uses episodes of the television series "Twilight Zone"" (1959-1964) to present in-depth discussions of a wide variety of topics. After viewing an episode, the class will engage in activities to encourage deep contemplation of social justice issues. Creator, Rod Serling, was a UU.

Our first "7th-10th Grade: Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education Workshop" held its first class on Sunday September 17th. Registrants meet on the third Sunday of the month from 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. in the Multipurpose Room. Please try to give this group some privacy on meeting days and avoid the multi-purpose room, if possible. This month's chapters included: What is Sexuality?, Examining Values, The Language of Sexuality, Anatomy and Physiology, and Personal Concerns About Puberty.

We have found a Buildings and Grounds Leader – in fact, we have found a Team to work with Judy on maintaining our building and grounds. Tom and Pat Robinson have agreed to coordinate the care of building issues, and David Moore has agreed to be available to help out in the Memorial Garden and support the work of our paid landscaper. Thank You All.

During the summer months we have continued to update our building and grounds and catch up on much needed maintenance. Our **antiquated Irrigation system** was **replaced** with a more efficient, effective and smaller system providing water to those plants that require it. Piping and timers were also replaced. Lucio continues to maintain our monthly landscaping and recently was called to remove the trees we lost during a recent

storm . . .an enormous job for one person and well done.

The interior walls, with the exception of the Sanctuary, were painted as well as the metal door and window frames. We had the wallpaper removed from both restrooms and updated them with newly painted walls and metal stalls. – no more pink and blue. Our Aesthetics Committee (Carol Calkins, Joye Melby and Priscilla London) now has the job of rehanging artwork and other wall items. They also have chosen the carpeting and flooring that will or may be already covering our floors. This was a time-consuming and frustrating experience; however, I am sure we will all appreciate the result. This threesome also provides table center pieces for our different activities.

Another of our **Heating and Air Conditioning Units** (HVAC) has been replaced, which leaves 7 to go. These have been in place for close to 20 years. In our short range forecast we are hoping to replace 2 units per year. (Give generously. These are expensive but necessary items!)

The lock and handle on the Office door —will have hopefully been replaced by the time you read this with one that looks very much the same but has a different key. This means if you have a key to the old lock, it will not work. If you have need of a key, please check with Judy to sign out a new one. She has designed a system for keeping track of our keys to the building.

Lighting continues to be an issue; however, it is not being ignored. As time goes on, we will find more to work on, but now we have help and for that we are so grateful.
