Reflections on a Work-From-Home Day

I'm working from home today. We got word this morning from the plumbing company that our sewer pipe dig is more complicated than we anticipated. At breakfast, I looked at my Facebook memories from 2020 and they were filled with dark and wry pandemic humor. As you receive this edition of the newsletter, Easter, that ancient season of rebirth and renewal, will be upon us.

How are these things related? Our current pivot after a facility emergency called on skills we learned during the COVID-19 pandemic. That includes technology that enables us to worship remotely, of course, but we also gained skills of flexibility and resourcefulness, patience and good humor. I'm tempted, in that humorous spirit, to adopt a terrible Terminator impression: "We'll be BACK."

I'm asking us to FLIP the way we approach normal and abnormal. The current state of the world - genocide and environmental degradation, entrenched incarceration culture, hoarding and poverty side-by-side - these "normal" things are emergencies. A pipe that needs repair. A kitchen out of order for an unknown period. Canceled or modified events. These things are not normal, but neither are they emergencies.

I have such hope for our near and long-term future. The name change voting is underway! A new project is in the works for spiritual formation opportunities in partnership with other UU congregations. The Golden Rule Committee is meeting. General Assembly, with changes to the UUA constitution on the agenda, is coming soon.
